New Faculty Orientation

August 21 & 22 • 9 a.m.-4 p.m. HL 104

New faculty are invited to join us for this two day face-toface event to discover key information and make critical contacts to enable them to fulfill their instructional role. A series of expert-led sessions and stations will equip them with a repertoire of resources, supports, and services related to teaching, learning, and student success. Topics include teaching essentials, TRU culture and strategic priorities, and work/life aides for them and their students.

Syllabus: Design & Align (Part I & II) - 2 offerings

PIDP - Technology for Teaching & Learning @ TRU

In this eleven-week program, you will have the opportunity to explore a wide range of technologies available to support teaching and learning at TRU including: WordPress, H5P, Sli. do and Twine. You will examine when, why and how to use technology in your courses and will learn how to ensure the technology you use is accessible and why accessible technology is important. You will be encouraged to learn by doing; emphasis will be on creating materials and learning experiences which should be for use in your current or future teaching practice.

Introduction to the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL)

September 17 • 10:30-11:30 a.m. Online

The Scholarship of Teaching of Learning (SoTL) involves faculty (very often with students as partners) undertaking systematic inquiry about student learning – informed by prior scholarship on teaching and learning – and going public with the results. As Pat Hutchings, The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching notes, SoTL involves "faculty bringing their habits and skills as scholars to their work as teachers... habits of asking questions, gathering evidence of all different kinds, drawing conclusions or raising new questions, and bringing what they learn through that to... students' learning." If you have questioned your own teaching and impact on your learners when attempting something in your classroom that is tried, or new, you likely have asked SoTL research questions. Join the discussion and explore what teaching and learning research might look like as part of your current teaching and/or research program.

Supporting International Students' Academic Success Series

Introduction to Peer Review of Teaching and Instructional Support

September 26 • 10:30 a.m.- 12 p.m. HL 269

The Peer Review of Teaching and Instructional Support working group, which was formed as a sub-committee of the Teaching and Learning Committee of Senate in fall of 2018, worked to develop a peer review of teaching and instructional support process that is adaptable, scalable, flexible, and iterative—and designed to support faculty in reflecting on and improving their professional practice. You may have heard about this process at your Faculty Council in fall, and now you're invited to come out and learn more about the process and how it can benefit you.

Introduction to Teaching Triangles

September 26 • 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. HL 269

Have you ever wished you could be a fly on the wall in someone else's classroom? If so, then the Teaching Triangles program is for you. This program provides faculty with the opportunity to gain insight into their teaching and their students' learning through a non-evaluative, formative process of reciprocal classroom visits and guided self-reflection. Three faculty members coordinate visits to each others' classes once over the term, committing to visiting approximately one hour of class for each colleague in the triangle. Groups then meet to discuss what they learned about their own practice through their observations and reflections. Feel free to bring your own group, or we will coordinate one for you!

Allyship and Advocacy for Indigenous Communities TBD • 11 a.m.- 12 p.m.

Online

This workshop will empower participants to take concrete actions in support of Indigenous communities. Through case studies and guided conversations, participants will explore allyship principles and brainstorm initiatives to address issues of equity and justice. Attendees will leave with a toolkit for advocating for Indigenous rights and well-being.

The Future of Education: Integrating Generative AI into Your Curriculum with Dr. Ajay Dhruv

In this interactive workshop, faculty will explore the potential of Generative AI to transform teaching and learning. Participants will learn how to effectively integrate Generative AI tools into their curriculum, enhancing student engagement, creativity, and critical thinking. Through hands-on activities and discussions, faculty will discover innovative ways to leverage AI-generated content, explore tools, and create personalized learning experiences. By the end of the workshop, participants will have a clear understanding of how to harness the power of Generative AI to improve student outcomes and stay ahead of the curve in education.r classroom and the technology and best practices to support them.

Integrating Indigenous Knowledge into Teaching: Land-Based Learning and Traditional Ecological Knowledge

Online

This immersive workshop will take participants outdoors to experience land-based learning firsthand. Guided by Indigenous knowledge holders, attendees will discover the interconnectedness of nature, culture, and spirituality. They will learn how to design lessons that incorporate local ecosystems and Indigenous perspectives, fostering a deeper connection to the environment.

Introduction to Writing & Assessing PLOs

October 17 • 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. HL 269

While many faculty members have experience writing course learning outcomes (CLOs), and all teaching faculty have experience assessing CLOs through course assignments and exams, not everyone is as familiar with writing and assessing program-level learning outcomes (PLOs). These skills are not only helpful for those undergoing program review, but for anyone wishing to ensure the programs they create will support learners in reaching their educational goals. In this session, we'll discuss principles for composing PLOs that are pitched at the right level and reflect programs' aims and ambitions for their graduates. We'll also explore both direct and indirect strategies for assessing student achievement of PLOs.



Bringing SoTL Research into Your Classroom

October 24 • 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. Online

Faculty are always innovating in their classrooms, collaborating and bringing in new ways of teaching and new ways for learning. While we can observe these benefits, what is our evidence? How do we create a research proposal that will start us on the path to find that evidence? This session is for new and experienced researchers who would like to explore the idea of conducting SoTL research in their teaching and learning, and who want to start creating a proposal for that research. This interactive session is an excellent precursor to bringing a SoTL project into your teaching, and preparing for possibly applying for CELT SoTL Scholars funding in early 2025.

Integrating Indigenous Knowledge into Teaching: Indigenous Pedagogies and Learning Styles

October 28 • 11 a.m.- 12 p.m. Online

Through interactive activities and discussions, participants will explore the diverse range of Indigenous pedagogical approaches. They will learn about storytelling, experiential learning, and the role of Elders and community members as educators. Attendees will gain practical insights into tailoring their teaching methods to align with Indigenous learning styles.

Understanding Indigenous Perspectives: Introduction to Indigenous Worldviews and Perspectives

November 4 • 11 a.m.- 12 p.m. Online

In this workshop, participants will embark on a journey to explore the rich tapestry of Indigenous worldviews. Through storytelling, discussions, and multimedia presentations, attendees will gain insights into the interconnectedness of spirituality, land, and community in Indigenous perspectives. The workshop will emphasize the need to approach these perspectives with humility and respect.

Understanding Indigenous Perspectives: Cultural Competency and Effective Communication

November 18 • 11 a.m.- 12 p.m. Online

Building cultural competency requires active engagement and dialogue. In this workshop, attendees will participate in role-playing scenarios, learning to navigate crosscultural communication with sensitivity. They will gain insights into non-verbal cues, respectful terminology, and active listening. Guest speakers from Indigenous communities will share their experiences, helping participants understand the nuances of respectful engagement.

Evidencing Your Teaching

November 20 • 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. Online

This workshop will explore dimensions of teaching using an educational leadership mapping tool that will help to evidence and support your teaching skills beyond course evaluations and through to tenure and promotion.

Integrating Multimodality in Curriculum and Research with Makerspace

November 20 • 9:30 - 11:30 a.m. TRU's Makerspace

Using hands-on and experiential learning through the Makerspace, faculty will be given practical ways to think about how to design/redesign classroom assignments or projects that go beyond written or oral presentations.
